Surfing the Net

The age of technology is wonderful! However, it's a proverbial "two-edge sword." The computer (including CD's and On-line searches) will not, indeed cannot, replace searching the dusty musty records of courthouses and other archives for original documents or using credible microfilm of the same.

Families that do not own personal computers or do not subscribe to an On-line server should not feel left out. More and more local libraries provide their patrons with at least one computer that has Inter-net access. The library will have varying regulations for this service including time limitations. Therefore your time will be more efficiently used if you are aware of some of the options that are available. There are thousands of genealogy and historical sites throughout the world to be explored. Several books have been published to help us find some of the genealogical sites including *Virtual Roots: A Guide to Genealogy and Local History on the World Wide Web* by Thomas Jay Kemp (Wilmington, Delaware: Scholarly Resources, Inc., 1997) and *Netting Your Ancestors: Genealogical Research on the Internet* by Cyndi Howells (Baltimore: Genealogy Publishing Company, 1998).

Because of my work schedule, etc.—Oh, if there were only more hours in my day!—I find that my On-line time is generally limited to determining what repositories are available in a particular region and their holdings. For example, anyone with Massachusetts ancestry may find the site called "Archives and Manuscript Repositories in Massachusetts" very helpful. Its address is <<http://lcweb.loc.gov/coll/nucmc/masites.html>>.

Via queries placed in several forums, such as GenWeb and RootsWeb, many surfers have connected with heretofore-unknown cousins. These forums provide a medium for sharing information. Unfortunately, many surfers take the data provided by their new cousins as true facts. Let us remember that at best, the shared information is secondary and, sadly, often undocumented. We should consider the material in exactly the same fashion we should published genealogies—often wonderful clues to follow. We cannot forget that we need to try to get back to original records and explore the best evidence we can find to back our claims of our family's lineage. Pipe dreams and family tales can lead individuals to adopted ancestors rather than a true lineage.

WWI Draft Registrations of Ashtabula County, Ohio

The unrest leading to *The Great War*, World War I, started as early as June 1914 when a Serbian student assassinated Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife. Before long, Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia. By August 1914 German forces mobilized declaring war against Russia and France, and invaded Luxembourg. England declared war on Austria-Hungary and Japan declared war on Germany. By early 1917, it was very evident that this great unrest would spill over and affect the United States.

On 3 February 1917, President Wilson appeared before the United States Congress and announced the break in official relations between the United States and Germany. On 6 April 1917 the United States declared war on Germany and the Central Powers. At that time only two hundred thousand (200,000) Americans were in the regular army. The United States was faced with the need to raise and equip an army that would be capable of helping the Allied cause and deliver the much-needed extra punch to end World War I.

In total 24 million men registered for the draft between 5 June 1917 and 12 September 1918. These men, citizens and aliens alike, were men born between 1874 and 1900.

All of the original draft cards for the entire United States are located at the National Archives-Southeast Region in East Point, Georgia. The are also available on microfilm at the National Archives regional branches, and at the Family

History Library in Salt Lake City.

Ashtabula County, Ohio, located in the northeast corner of Ohio (borders Pennsylvania and Lake Erie), required two draft boards to register men (not already enlisted in the U.S. Armed Services).

The abstracts below (in order found in the original records) give us information about the men registering in Ashtabula County. The abstracts contain (when recorded): the name of the registrant; date of registration; race; residence; birth date and place; employment [empl] and address; and name and address of his nearest relative [rel].

Cherokee Removal Records Henderson Roll, 1835

Beginning 8 July 1817 the United States made several treaties with the Cherokee Indians (as well as other tribes including the Creek, Choctaw, and Chickasaw) which ultimately lead to the ceding of Indian lands east of the Mississippi River in exchange for land to the west. Preserved records include several different lists of families, generally of the Western Cherokees, are available through the National Archives: Mullay Roll, 1848; Siler Roll, 1851; Chapman Roll, 1852; Powell Roll, 1867, Swetland Rolls, 1869; and Hester Roll, 1884. Generally these lists were made to determine eligibility for payments due under the 1835 treaty. The Chapman roll is a receipt roll for payments actually made.

The only list compiled prior to the Cherokee removal, "Trail of Tears," is the census taken of the Cherokee Indian families of Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, and Tennessee who would be removed to the west. The roll lists heads of families and gives information concerning each family and its property [see column headings listed at the right]. This census was compiled in 1835 by Daniel Henderson and is commonly called the Henderson Roll. The list is not without errors – it includes a large number of Cherokees who avoided the "Trail of Tears" and omits others who were removed. The Henderson Roll is available on National Archives micropublication T496 (1 roll). An index to the Henderson Roll is given in *Those Who Cried*, compiled by James W. Tyner. Tyner's index should not (nor any index) be used as a substitute for looking at the microfilm – remember an index is only one small tool.

Three Woodard heads of house are found in Georgia-Tom Woodard, Sunday Woodard (enumerated immediately following Tom) and Jack Woodard. The Tom and Sunday Woodard families were residing on the

Oostenolle [Oostanaula] River (probably in an Indian community called Woodward Town) while Jack resided on the Conasauga River. The Conasauga and Coosawattee rivers join near present day Resaca and New Echota (Gordon County). At this juncture, it is called the Oostanaula River.

From the Henderson Roll we learn that the household of Tom Woodard contained 3 males over the age of 18, 1 female over the age of 16, 3 males under 18, 2 females under 16 for a total of 8 Cherokees (1 full blood, 1 half blood, and 6 quadroons. One individual was able to read English and one Cherokee (possibly the same individual). The family also had eight Negro slaves. Tom Woodard had a farm containing 16 houses and with 30 acres in cultivation some of it in corn.

The family of Sunday Woodard, residing next to Tom Woodard, consisted of a younger family containing 1 male over 18 and 1 female over 16 for a total of two Cherokees, both quadroons. Sunday had a farm with 2 houses and eight acres under cultivation. He had no slaves to assist with his work of raising 200 bushels of corn. In this family we also find one individual reading English and one Cherokee.

Because Sunday has a household, of two quadroon Cherokees and resides next door to Tom Woodard, it is possible that Sunday was an adult son of Tom.

Jack Woodard, enumerated some ten pages from Tom and Sunday had a family consisting of 9 Cherokees: 1 male under 18, 2 males over 18, 4 females under 16 and 2 females over 16. Two members of the household were enumerated as full bloods, one half-breed, and 6 quadroons. No numbers were given in the categories of reading English and reading Cherokee. Jack had a farm with 3 houses and five acres under cultivation.

Internet Capsule:

U.S. Army Military History Institute



U.S. Army Military History Institute is the Army's central repository for historical materials. It's mission is to collect, preserve, and make available source materials on Military History (particularly American military history). The institute, located at Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania, has a vast collection of original source materials including diaries, letters, memoirs, photographs, art work, and personal records. The holdings of the facility must be used at the research site as they do not circulate.

Searchable catalogs On-line include Reference Bibliographies, Archives Database, Photo Collection Database, U.S. Army Unit History Bibliographies, American Civil War Biographical Bibliographies, and Civil War Unit History Bibliographies. A search of the Photo Collection for Woodard was negative, but Woodward had 25 hits:

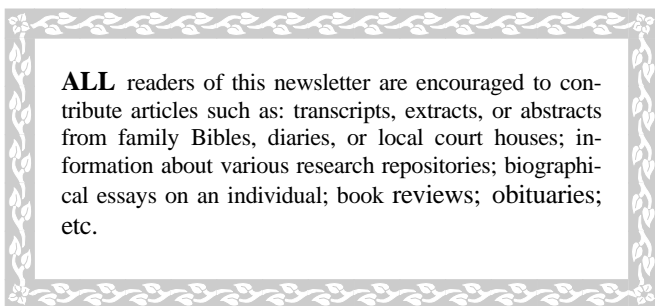
